Pupil Premium 2012 – 13

Pupil Premium is allocated to schools with pupils on roll in January 2012 that are known to have:

- a) been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any time in the last six years
- b) children in care who have been looked after continuously for at least six months.

Each of these pupils will attract £600. The Department for Education states that 'schools will have the freedom to spend the Premium, which is additional to the underlying schools budget, in a way they think will best support the raising of attainment for the most vulnerable pupils.'














We encourage parents to register their child as eligible for FSM with the school so that Hazel Oak receives their maximum Pupil Premium entitlement.

At Hazel Oak School Pupil Premium is dedicated to raising the academic, social, emotional and vocational attainment of our most vulnerable pupils to ensure they achieve maximum independence.

Funding is allocated to areas identified as priorities, linked to the School Development Plan and the needs of individual learners. The Sutton Trust Toolkit is utilised in order to identify interventions that are likely to have maximum impact on learners' overall attainment. Priority areas are reviewed on an annual basis, based on barriers to learning, impact of interventions and learners' needs.
